Welcome to this sixth issue of *Discussing Bach*, featuring an edited conversation on the topic of 'The Future of Bach Sources', recorded live at the Bachfest Leipzig in June 2023.

The discussion in this issue formed part of Bach Network's session on the 2023 festival theme, 'Bach for [the] Future'. As with the other issues of *Discussing Bach*, the presentations were unrehearsed, with none of the presenters knowing what the others would say, keeping the conversation and responses fresh and spontaneous. Each of the four speakers was given a disciplined five-minute slot to present their research, with a brief discussion before moving to the next, and the

chairing of the session was shared between the speakers to facilitate a continuous flow of conversation. At the end of the session in Leipzig there were a few questions from the public, which are not included in this recording.

We are very grateful to Larry Molinaro and Philipp Marx for stage-managing the recording in Leipzig and for their technical assistance, and to John Harrington for expertly editing the video. We also thank the Bach-Archiv Leipzig for supporting Bach Network's platform at the Bachfest, and their kind permission to use the audio materials. Most of the presenters are pursuing further work based on the research discussed here: as always, the *Discussing Bach* web and YouTube pages will be kept updated with new publications on this topic as they appear.

Also recorded as part of Bach Network's presentation in Leipzig was a panel discussion on 'The Future of Bach Performance', an edited version of which will be published as the seventh issue of *Discussing Bach* in early spring 2024. We are also happy to announce that in the new year we will be producing a wide-ranging podcast series to complement the issues raised in *Discussing Bach*. Watch out for this brand-new venture on our social media pages and our website.

In June 2024, Bach Network will again appear at the Bachfest Leipzig, presenting on the festival theme of 'Choral Total', which marks the 300th anniversary of Bach's chorale cantata cycle and the 500th anniversary of the first Lutheran hymnal. It will also be the 20th anniversary of Bach Network, and we will celebrate this at our eleventh Dialogue Meeting to be held at Madingley Hall, Cambridge, UK, from Sunday 7 until Wednesday 11 July (inclusive) 2024, where new research will be presented and exchanged in a friendly and relaxed atmosphere. Details of the programme and registration will be published early in the new year. We encourage you to join us for these exciting events.

In the meantime, we hope that the presentations and discussion in this issue, together with the accompanying written materials, will be a catalyst for you to engage in deeper discussion with others, and gain a richer understanding of the sources for Bach's life, his music, and his world.

Manuel Bärwald is a Professor of Library and Information Science at the Leipzig Hochschule für Technik, Wirtschaft und Kultur. Before that, he worked for 15 years in the research department of the Bach-Archiv Leipzig. His musicological publications include numerous articles about J.S. Bach and music in eighteenth-century Leipzig; most recently, he edited the 1725 version of the *St John Passion* for the revised *Neue Bach-Ausgabe* (Kassel: Bärenreiter, 2021).



Andrew Frampton is Lecturer in Music at St Catherine's College, University of Oxford, and a Teaching Associate in Music at the University of Nottingham. His publications include several articles, book chapters and edited collections on J.S. Bach, Jan Dismas Zelenka and their contemporaries, along with critical editions of their music. He is a member of the Bach Network Council, and a trustee of the Music Libraries Trust (UK & Ireland) and the New Berlioz Edition.



Ruth Tatlow is a Visiting Researcher at Academy of Music and Drama, University of Gothenburg University, and throughout 2023 a Visiting Research Fellow at Clare Hall, University of Cambridge. Her numerous publications on compositional process and practice in J.S. Bach's music include two monographs. She is cofounder of Bach Network and chair of the Bach Network Council.



Bettina Varwig is a Professor in Music at the University of Cambridge and Fellow of Emmanuel College. She has published extensively on the music of Johann Sebastian Bach, Heinrich Schütz and their contemporaries, exploring issues of musical meaning, listening practices and musical rhetoric, as well as historiography and reception, in particular the afterlife of J.S. Bach in the twentieth and twenty-first centuries. She is a member of the Bach Network Council.

<u>Bach Network</u> was founded in 2004 to create a forum to talk about Bach's music. Early conversations evolved into <u>Dialogue Meetings</u>, which became Bach Network's primary in-person means of discussion. From these meetings came our online journal *Understanding Bach*, where the fruit of new research discussions could be studied and enjoyed. What was missing from the written journal articles was the immediacy of the dialogue conversation and questions. This is where *Discussing Bach* enters the picture.

Discussing Bach is a multimedia, web-based publication superseding Bach Network's open access journal <u>Understanding Bach</u> (2006–17). Featuring scholars engaged in ground-breaking research, each issue of <u>Discussing Bach</u> comprises:

- Topic-specific articles may also be published as part of the issue.

Copyright: Bach Network holds the copyright to the discussion to protect the intellectual copyright of the researchers' ideas, some of which will be unpublished at the time of recording. Authorised subtitles are provided to facilitate accurate citation.

Scholars are selected to contribute because of the impact of their latest research discoveries, as well as their peer-reviewed publications, whether already in press or under contract, and/or because they are sponsored by a competitive research programme.
